As I write this I am sitting on an airplane on my way to some meetings related to our being a host site for the Global Leadership Summit. Ending up with a middle seat on a five-hour cross-country flight is not the most comfortable way to travel, but it did give me some time to reflect on the interesting diversity, complexity, and commonalities resident in the people on this flight. I do not know anything about any of them. All around me are so many stories representative of the kinds of hopes, fears, pain, and happiness that make up the quest for a meaningful life. For this span of time I became more keenly aware of an everyday reality that we often take for granted. There are people all around us with whom our lives intersect, all of them in need of God's grace.

As we prepare for Easter we have been looking in Scripture at the wonderful news that God is in the business of restoring humanity. That we need restoring is a profound and fundamental truth that far too many of us fail to appreciate. In our therapeutic age we give too little credence to the truth that we are all marred and held back by sin. We are learning anew that we do this at our peril.

The good news of this season is that this sin need neither destroy us nor define us. Jesus has come. Jesus has died. Jesus has risen from the dead. These are the facts of the season. The result of these facts is that we can be forgiven and restored. This is the good news of this Lenten and Easter season.

So, as I look around and think about the people sharing a plane ride across the country, I am reminded that underneath whatever façade they present to others around them, whatever notions I may assume about what kind of people they are, in reality they are broken human beings in need of the grace of God, in need of His restoring work. I wonder if they will ever hear this good news? I wonder if they know that the God of the universe loves them? I wonder if they have someone in their lives who can show them and tell them of this restoring God?

This Easter season let's pay a little more attention to the people around us. As we interact with them, I wonder if they might see in us intimations that God is restoring us? I wonder if they will hear from us about the hope we have in this restoring God?

Change Doesn't Bite (hereafter called Change) is a fast and enjoyable read that's a natural fit to our church vision, Transforming lives in a Christ-centered Community. Change casts change and its rewards in an entertaining setting and would especially be valuable to those in their 20's to 40's who love baseball and the city (San Francisco) and want to benefit from change. VCC's Drew Sanders has woven his interest in mentoring into an insightful novel about Sam (a lab dog) who seems to have everything under control until his best friend and mentor Larry (a pug) unexpectedly moves. A bonus to their mentoring relationship is sharing their love for the San Francisco Giants. Larry's parting advice to Sam is to resist change when he says:

- Stay close to the pack (other dogs that are "rabid" Giants fans)
- Stick to your routines
- Don't explore the city
- The Giants need you...here's my pass to the "Dog Patch" (the special place at AT&T park were the pack cheered on the Giants).

As Sam gets involved in the 2010 season he meets various dogs that garner his respect by their insights and shared Giants experiences and change Sam's life through their mentoring advice. Sam makes major changes in his life and engages in service to benefit others. The mutual benefit derived from mentoring interactions is portrayed in memorable situations. Some of the life-changing advice included:

- Notice more, let go and use everything (listen in a curious manner and use all your surroundings in engaging others)
- Listen to others, be others-focused, and passionate about your cause (develop a view to see things from the other's point of view)

 Create a personal definition of success (how are you combining your heart and mind to focus your efforts on individual and team goals so that you may compete to your fullest?)

Each mentor is based on five real characters (e.g. John Wooden, UCLA coach who won 10 NCAA basketball championships in 12 years, 7 in a row, and Joe Ehrmann) and advice that Drew has distilled from their writings or, in the case of Ehrmann, from personal interactions. Ehrmann is a 13-year NFL veteran and winner of numerous awards, including Parade magazine calling him "The Most Important Coach in America" (www. coachforamerica.com/meet-joe). In the forward to the book, Ehrmann related his 10-year relationship with Drew through Drew's foundation which raised funds to distribute Ehrmann's books to coaches or parents who wanted to benefit from Ehrmann's insights but couldn't afford it. Drew played a key role in bringing Ehrmann to speak at Amador Valley High School in 2012 to a packed audience.

Besides seeing Drew's sparkling and energetic personality come through the book, I enjoyed the insights to San Francisco (neighborhoods, streets, restaurants, etc.) and especially the Giants. Drew's descriptions brought back memories of piling into my dad's car, driving over to Seals Stadium to watch the new Giants (including Willie "The Say Hey Kid" Mays) and other major league teams who before had been on the *other coast*.

I Love to Tell the Story

The Easter story is perhaps the most important story in all of Christianity. To be sure, Christmas is important because it gave Jesus Christ to the world but His leaving is much more meaningful to the Christian than His coming.

The Jewish tradition of the Old Testament was for worshipers to bring animals (especially lambs) to be sacrificed to God as a sin offering. The blood would purify and make atonement (forgive or make amends) for their sins. This was the order under the Old Covenant with God.

When Jesus came under the New Covenant Christ was the representation of the sacrificial lamb. That is why Jesus is referred to as the Lamb of God. He died to atone for the sin of the world once and for all. He was the final sacrifice. We, thankfully, no longer have to sacrifice animals to atone for our sin. It is the blood of Jesus that cleanses us from all sin.

When He was crucified on the cross, the sin of the world was upon Him and He bore it all even though He himself was without sin and blameless. Because of God's great love for us all, Jesus bore the punishment that should have been ours to bear individually. The Bible tells us that "the wage of sin is death"! We are covered by Jesus' death on the cross and because of God's grace we will never have to die to atone for our sin.

What is even more remarkable is that three days after He died, Jesus Christ was resurrected. Christ's resurrection is tied to the future hope of all Christians—that we too will be resurrected. And in our resurrected state, we "will continue the bodily existence that we enjoy in this world, but with bodies that are transformed by the Holy Spirit." (N. T. Wright)


Prior to the Kickoff meeting, women can complete profile cards. These will be available at the Women's Ministries table between Sunday worship services and online. Our team will prayerfully match mentors with women who would like to enter a mentoring relationship and announce the matches at the Kickoff. During the meeting, the team will share the Biblical basis for mentoring and discipleship, assure the mentors and mentees of support by the prayer warriors, and offer simple instruction to mentors.

Mentors are encouraged to serve as confidants, encouragers and role models as they walk alongside their mentees. Prayer is an important part of the mentoring relationships. Women who serve as prayer warriors support each mentor/mentee pair in prayer, and the mentors and mentees also spend time praying together. Women who would like an opportunity to invest their lives in 'younger' women and 'younger' women who would like 'older' women to come alongside them for a season of spiritual encouragement should consider completing profile cards and attending the Kickoff.

Heart Connection also desires to offer training, encouragement and accountability for women who have already entered mentoring relationships. If you are currently in a mentoring relationship, we invite you to attend the Kickoff to learn more about how the ministry can support you.

Financial Update

For the past several years we have provided a financial update at this time of year, after the first four months of our fiscal year have passed. And each time we provide our best estimate of how we will end this fiscal year based upon what has transpired so far. So we will attempt to do the same this year.

The table shows the contributions for each of the four months compared to the budget. As has been true over the past several years, the contributions in December compared to the budget are significantly less than for the other three months. We continue to interpret this pattern as being due to the recession since year-end bonuses and commissions are lower than when the economy is better. So for the purposes of forecasting, we will take the same approach as we have in the past.

Month	Contributions Relative to Budget
October	-\$5K
November	-\$25K
December	-\$45K
January	\$0K

The reasonable predictor for contributions in the remaining eight months of our fiscal year is to base it upon October, November, and January. So if the giving pattern remains the same, the average monthly deficit will be \$10,000. Thus, our best forecast for giving in FY2013 is a shortfall of \$155K. That is a disconcertingly large deficit, representing about 7% of our annual budget. The total of contributions so far this year is 4% lower than for the same time period a year ago. On the expenditure side, so far we have spent about \$29,000 less than budget, so that helps a bit, but unless some significant changes are made to ministry plans, we would not continue to under-spend at that same rate. We have not yet made any such decisions on ministry changes, but we will continue to closely monitor both our contributions and spending.

An update on the status of our *Setting Us Free* contributions reveals a more positive story. The initial first fruits offering for this capital campaign was \$626K, received in November 2011. Since that time, an additional \$777K has been received. That's a total of \$1.403K! So the contributions to this fund continue to be strong, and if they continue at the same level, we should be able to reach our goal of paying off our loan balance by the end of 2014. And remember, 10% of the contributions to the campaign goes towards mission projects, so to date we have raised \$140,000 to enhance our support of various mission needs. So many others are being blessed as we work towards eliminating our debt. Thank you so much for your faithful and generous giving to *Setting Us Free*.
