We never want to become complacent in this quest and so we are committed to always striving to get better. Beginning on Sunday, October 7 we will be participating in a Spiritual Life Survey that will give us needed feedback to assess how we as a church are doing in assisting you grow in your faith. By participating in this survey you can contribute not only to your own spiritual growth, but to all those who are a part of our fellowship.

So what does this mean exactly? It means that sometime between October 7-20 you will need to commit 30 to 45 minutes to take this survey. It is an online survey and you will be directed from our website (vcclive.org) to the appropriate link. If you do not have access to a computer or need any kind of assistance, we can provide that. We will have stations at the church where you can complete the survey if you would like to do that.

The survey is completely anonymous so no one will be checking up on any of your personal responses. The results that we will receive are a cumulative report on the health and the needs of our congregation as a whole. It will help us determine areas where we are doing well and areas where we can be doing better. The more of you that participate the more accurate will this assessment be.

The New Testament is full of "one another" commands. Some of these are to encourage one another, love one another, and serve one another. These types of commands remind us that God has given us each other as a precious resource in our walk with Christ. I encourage you to enter into this opportunity with a "one another" mind set, to participate so that we can all grow in Christ more deeply.

If you want to take that next step in identification with this local body, our next membership class will be in late October on a Friday night and Saturday morning.

Children Receive More Than a Shoebox!

Ankhtuya clutched the picture. It was a color illustration of Jesus holding out His arms to comfort a child. "The girl looks like me," she exclaimed, pointing to the similar black hair and rosy cheeks. "When I see this picture, I feel like Jesus is hugging me. I am going to keep this forever."

The Mongolian girl pulled another gift out of her shoe box and showed it triumphantly to her sisters. "A teddy bear, I have always wanted one!" she said. Ankhtuya came with her mother and two of her sisters to the Operation Christmas Child program at their rural village in Mongolia, a vast and sparsely populated nation between China

and Russia.

They didn't know what to expect—only that local Christians had brought gifts from America. Ankhtuya had heard about Jesus through Sunday school classes at the local church, but she didn't truly realize how much He cared about the hopes and dreams of a little girl in Mongolia. When she heard the Christmas story through music and dramatic skits at the Operation Christmas Child distribution, it brought the Gospel to life for her. "I realize that Jesus is alive. He is here," she said as she glanced again at the photo of Jesus and the child. "I want our Sunday school teachers to teach more about Jesus to us."

Balginyan rises early every morning to milk his family's cows and helps his father look after their herd of sheep, goats, and yaks. Horses are his mode of transportation as he leads the livestock to good pasture. When the boy opened his box, he



was amazed to find a beautiful toy horse, as well as other small gifts. Along with his box, Balginyan also received "The Greatest Gift of All" Gospel booklet in his own language. He was so taken by the story and pictures that he carried it with him when he herded the sheep that evening. "I took the book with me and read it," he said. "After that, I started to read the Bible and I began to pray. I learned that God is a shepherd, the Great Shepherd."

We want to equip the next generation with the knowledge and tools necessary to create high quality media using high definition cameras, mixing on digital audio consoles, record and produce a band and so much more.


Lisa Lee Akacsos has an extensive background in script writing and directing. She will be leading a drama program that will give students with a desire to act or to write a script an opportunity to do that to the glory of God. She will coordinate the students' efforts with the pastors' series teaching material to produce skits as well as to present material for special events such as Vacation Bible School, Easter and Christmas.

Music lessons will be offered by Danny Min, Scott Welsh, and Jake Lemmer. Instruments of focus will be drums, electric guitar, acoustic guitar and bass guitar. Students who express an interest in Christian music ministry will also be given an opportunity to audition for the Student Ministries teams, leading the TNT middle school and VISION high school students in worship. This audition would simply cover basic musical/vocal skills.

James Whittle and Josh Pickering will show the students what it's like working behind the scenes. We will give them a tour of the facility and all of the technology-driven areas. Areas of focus are video and audio recording, live sound, media format encoding, lighting, stage management, green screen compositing, and basic Photoshop.

Our vision is to teach students how to serve one another in ministry, as well as serve other ministries.

We will start the program on October 23. Sessions will be held on Tuesday from 3:30-4:15pm for music lessons and from 4:30-5:30PM for drama. Wednesday students will meet from 3:30-4:30PM for audio visual media training. This free program is for all middle school and high school students.
